Lessons and Carols

The service of Lessons and Carols (originally nine) was created by Edward Benson, Bishop of Truro, in 1880, at the suggestion of G. H. S. Walpole, later Bishop of Edinburgh.

When Edward Benson later became Archbishop of Canterbury, he took a special interest in All Saints' Warlingham and rode across from Addington Palace in Croydon to see our St Christopher wall-painting, and various other features which had been re-discovered during the renovation and extension work in the 1890s.

The Nine Lessons and Carols format was quickly adopted by many other churches, most notably by King's College, Cambridge in 1918. It has been an annual feature of their Christmas worship ever since, and has been broadcast by the BBC every year, save one, since 1928.

The readings trace the story of God's love for his damaged creation and his determination to win us back, starting with the Fall in Genesis, through the prophecies of the coming Messiah (or 'Christ'), to the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem, in which, as St. John says: "[God] became flesh and lived amongst us, full of grace and truth".

The music illustrates what poets and composers down the ages - and right up to the modern day - have made of this remarkable and timeless story.

This year to protect one another from the Covid-19 virus, sadly, in accord with the Government rules, the congregation is not allowed to sing. We have provided the words, nonetheless, so that you can follow them in your heart, and maybe sing along to the live-streamed or recorded service in the comfort and safety of your own homes.

Processional Carol:

Carol Once in Royal David's City

Mrs C.F.Alexander wrote over 400 hymns. This carol evocatively sets the scene for the Christmas story – as God enters history as a real human baby, to be one of us. This hymn is one of a series she wrote based on the articles of the Creed. The tune is by Henry Gauntlett, arranged by A.H.Mann with the last verse descant by David Willcocks,

Only the words of this 15th Century carol survive. They convey a sense of amazement that so much trouble could come from a mere stolen apple, and then, that God could bring so much good out of so much evil. (With hints of Thomas Aquinas' "blessed fault"). This setting is by Boris Ord, organist and choirmaster of King's College Cambridge from 1929 to 1957.

Carol Of the Father's Heart

This is from a poem by Prudentius (348-413) which picks up John's theme of the eternal Word, loved from before the beginning of time. The arrangement and descant are by David Willcocks.

Of the Father's heart begotten ere the world from chaos rose He is Alpha; from that fountain all that is and has been flows; He is Omega of all things yet to come: the mystic close Evermore and evermore.

By his word was all created; He commanded and t'was done; Earth and sky and boundless ocean, Universe of three-in-one All that sees the moon's soft radiance, all that breathes beneath the sun Evermore and evermore.

Sing, ye heights of heaven, his praises; Angels and Archangels sing! Where so e'er ye be, ye faithful let your joyous anthems ring. Ev'ry tongue his name confessing, countless voices answering; Evermore and evermore.

3rd Lesson Isaiah 9:2. 6-7

Christ's birth and his kingdom are foretold by the Prophet Isaiah.

Choir: "O Radiant Dawn" – James MacMillan

Carol O Little Town of Bethlehem

This carol was written by Phillips Brooks (1835–1893), an Episcopalian Rector in Philadelphia. He visited Bethlehem in 1865 and, three years later, wrote the poem for his church. The tune we use is the English Folk Tune "Forest Green", collected and arranged by Vaughan-Williams.

- 1) O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie!
 Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by.
 Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light
 The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.
- O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth, And praises sing to God the King and peace to men on earth; For Christ is born of Mary; and, gathered all above, While mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wond'ring love.
- O Holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray:
 Cast out our sin and enter in, be born in us today.
 We hear the Christmas angels the great, glad tidings tell:
 O come to us, abide with us, our Lord, Emmanuel.

Choir: Lute Book Lullaby – Wm Ballet 17th Century

This lovely carol comes from William Ballet's 1600 collection of lute music which is now housed in the library of Trinity College, Dublin

7th **Lesson** John 1:1-14

St. John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation (please stand)

Choir: In Dulci Jubilo

This song, with alternating lines in Latin and English (originally German), was written in about 1328 by the mystic Heinrich Seuse. He later wrote that an angel told him that God had sent to bring him heavenly joys amid his sufferings; then they drew Heinrich into a dance, and the youth began a joyful song about the infant Jesus.
